Three studentships are available on a wide range of topics **including your own choice** in the fields of: social sciences, dentistry, medicine, law, economics, health information, public health, geography, statistics, qualitative and quantitative health services research, psychology and sociology.

DECIPHer (Development and Evaluation of Complex Interventions for Public Health Improvement) is a UKCRC Public Health Research Centre of Excellence. The Centre is a strategic partnership between the Universities of Cardiff (www.cardiff.ac.uk), Bristol (www.bristol.ac.uk) and Swansea (www.swan.ac.uk), in collaboration with key organisations concerned with public health policy and practice in Wales and the South West of England.

Staff in the DECIPHer Centre undertake methodologically innovative multidisciplinary research with a focus on the development and evaluation of complex interventions and policies to achieve sustainable improvements in the health and well-being of the public, with particular emphasis on children and young people. In collaboration with other Centres in the UK, DECIPHer leads and facilitates research of international excellence, placing emphasis on involving capacity and maximising health

Inequalities, creating new research young people and the public, tackling impact on, and engagement with, policy and practice in the UK and beyond.

FUNDING AND ELIGIBILITY

The studentships include funding for either three (PhD) or four (Master's plus PhD) years for a full maintenance grant (part-ESRC funded, part university) of £13,290 per annum and a Research and Training Support Grant for PhD students of £750 per annum.

The studentships are open to UK and EU candidates. Standard ESRC rules apply.

Applicants are expected to have gained an undergraduate degree at upper second class honours (2:1) or above.

If successful, you will be invited to be interviewed at the institution of your studentship.
